COMPUTERS Are Not Just For Someone Else Any More!

Living in the United States, I am constantly astounded by the almost unlimited use of computers. One only has to venture to the local supermarket or gas station to see computers at work. Remember how they used to check groceries at Pick 'n Pay or Checkers, and you always wondered how many mistakes they made. Didn't it amaze you when you first saw a college student check your whole shopping trolley in a fraction of the time using the bar code reader?

Well computers are leading the way into the 21st century and if you're not computer literate, you'll start to feel like illiterate people feel today. Kids are starting to learn how to operate and program computers from a very early age, and don't you feel helpless and confused when surrounded by computers or computer talk.

You may ask, "Why do I need a computer?" or "Can't I do it quicker by hand?" I respond by asking whether you remember how banks operated before the advent of computers and ATM machines. Remember waiting in line for a teller to make withdrawal or a deposit, or getting a speeding or parking ticket, just because you had to get to the bank before it closed on Friday afternoon. What about those long 3-10 day holds that banks used to put on out-of-town checks?

Again you may ask "How can I use a computer in my day to day life?

Currently there are thousands of software programs available to make your life easier. Imagine a computerized telephone directory which lists your friends and business associates telephone numbers, and calls anyone at the touch of a button. What about being able to plan the next weeks menu in advance, getting a printout of the meals, a list of all recipes to prepare the food, a shopping list of the ingredients, and an analysis of the nutritional content.

Have you ever thought of going on a diet? You would pay a dietician hundreds of dollars to prescribe a diet for

you. There are currently computer programs which analyze your desired reduction goal and the time frame in which you want to reduce, and recommends a diet, printing out weekly meal menus. You would reject any foods you do not eat, and the computer selects alternative foods with comparable nutritional value.

Most parents thinking of buying computers for their kids have the dreaded fear that all their kids will do is play computer games. I cannot deny that the first reaction that most children (and even some adults) have to a computer is "Where are the games?" Interest in games does not last long, and the educational value of a computer is incredible. Whether it be utilizing programs to read, write or do math problems, or programming the computer for other items such as mom's shopping list, dad's car comsumption or my baseball card collection, the educational value of a computer in the house is well worth the investment.

If you are seriously thinking of buying a computer, your next question will be "What computer should I buy? I've heard of Apple, MacIntosh, IBM, Compatible, Clone, DOS or Fixed Disk. One can go crazy deciding on what to buy!"

Deciding on a computer is not easy. Basically there are 2 types of PC's (Personal Computers) on the market, Apple and IBM. The Apple Computer range consists of Apple II in various forms, and the MacIntosh. The Apple II range is probably the most used educational computer in the world. It is reasonably priced and has an abundance of educational software available. The MacIntosh, with it's unique operating system is more pricy, but is the most user friendly computer available today. IBM, compatibles and clones are the most commonly used business computers on the market. A word of caution to anyone buying a clone, that is an IBM compatible computer not made by a recognized company such as Compaq, AT&T or Radio Shack to mention a few. If you are going to use the computer as a business tool, I would suggest that you buy a hard disk with your machine. This will save you having to use hundreds of floppy disks, and save you substantial time by not having to change disks every 2 minutes. Good luck with your computers!

A Rosh Hashana Message From Rabbi Jeff Wohlgelernter

As the High Holiday Season approaches, our thoughts are turned inward in introspection. Another year has come to a close, and once again we are blessed with a new beginning. We have a chance to assess our actions, measured against our potential, and to correct whatever needs correcting. As comforting as it may be to know that we can eradicate a year's worth of mistakes, it is equally frightening to ask ourselves the question: How do we start again? What role does the past play in the future? Where do we begin? Won't next Yom Kippur see us standing in the very same place, pleading for mercy for the very same actions?

In the Bible there is a story of two relatives, Abraham and Lot, who were faced with a challenge. Abraham was commanded to leave his land, his birth place and his father's house, to follow G-D to an undefined destination in order to reestablish his life. What faith it took for Abraham to unquestioningly follow his G-D! As great as Abraham's challenge was, Lot's was greater, for he hadn't spoken to G-D. He was placing his faith in Abraham who had placed it in his G-D. Yet as the Bible relates, Abraham became the father of our nation, steeped in righteousness, whereas Lot become the mayor of Sodom, a town renowned for its wickedness. The question arises as to why two men faced with the same challenge, both starting afresh from the same point, should have ended up having two diametrically opposed lifestyles?

The answer lies in the manner in which each left their homes. The Torah tells us that Abraham left his land, birthplace, and his fathers house behind him. Whereas in Lot's case, it merely states that he went along with Abraham. There is no mention of what Lot left behind. Abraham embarked on his journey leaving behind him all of his past activities. He intended to build a completely new life for himself. Lot, on the other hand, brought his past with him, and merely reshaped his old values and ideas to conform with his new life. This can be compared to writing on a sheet of paper. For the words to be seen clearly, one needs a clean page. To write on paper which was previously written upon, even though the writing was erased, would result in a blurred, sloppy, unclear composition. Abraham chose a clean sheet. Lot merely erased what he had written before, and re-used the same piece of paper. Hence Abraham rebuilt his life and gave it a clear and clean beginning. While Lot, who merely reshaped a previous lifestyle, ended up with a sketchy unclear revision.

On Yom Kippur, when we repent completely and wholeheartedly, our sins are eradicated as if they had never existed, and we are given a new lease on life. The question however, is how we will proceed in the future. If we take the past and merely modify it, we will end up in a similar or worse situation next year. But if we rewrite our


lives on a 'new sheet' and completely remodel our goals and values, then next Yom Kippur will see us standing at a much higher life station.

This idea holds true in every aspect of our lives. Whenever we start something new, when we begin again, we must realize that the past has brought us to the furture, but the future will be different. If we do this we will eliminate our feelings of dissatisfaction. Past experiences help shape our lives and guide our decisions, but they will never return. Feelings and thoughts such as "it used to be" or "back home we did" should give strength rather than remorse. The past should be a pleasant memory that brings a smile to our lips. Our lives can be very rich and fulfilling, even when we have to live them in a different way. If we come to terms with this we will be able to find satisfaction in our new lives and grow in a positive direction.

May the almighty bless our new year, our new beginning, and give us the strength to draw from the past in order to build a firmer future. Amen

TWO DOGS AND FREEDOM

Last year Ravan Press, and The Open School, published a collection of writings of black township children.

Two Dogs and Freedom is what happens when children are asked to describe in words and pictures the issues affecting their lives in South Africa today.

One finds here honest answers and the refreshing absence of ideological bias inevitable in adult interpretations of the same issues.

On the fringes of the world the children depict, and in the words they use, one detects the presence of the adults who (in many ways) influence and control their perceptions. But this does not diminish the brightness of a future in which eight-year old Moagi 'would like to have a wife and two children, a boy and a girl, and a big house and two dogs and freedom'.

The following have been reproduce exactly as they appear in the text.

What's happenining in the townships

In soweth there are a lot of boycotts, children boycotts because they say they want freedom. They say they want equal rights between whites and blacks.

They don't want the S.A.B.F. in the townships. They say when they are boycotting

all the children must be in the struggle and when you are not in the struggle they tresh you. And they don't want our parents to buy in town because that money wosted in town is the one that buys the years that kill the children in Sowets. Find when you disobey they make you drink fish oil that you have bought by Porce or they burn you alive.



The much publicised South African election has come and gone. Four months later we can now assess the results and changes that have occurred since then.

Has the PFP lost its political power? The PFP lost 8 of its constituencies in the election (Albany, Walmer, Wynberg, Maritzburg South, Maritzburg North, Bezuidenhout, Edenvale and Hillbrow). This loss meant that it has reduced it's seats in Parliament to 19.

The Conservative Party has taken over as the official opposition party, with its 20 seats, as opposed to the National party 115.

The results of the election were regarded as a setback to S.A. progress. The reaction of the rest of the world was one of disappointment and regarded as a further "spanner in the works."

Immediately after the election, the National Party, in an attempt to confirm its majority win, clamped down on the Group Areas Act.

Does the NP intend to procede with proposed reforms? In the eyes of many, the government is stalling for time and will not make any commitment to positive reform. The only piece of major legislation that has been reversed was the mixed marriages act.

This appears to be the time for opposition to stand up

and be noticed. Prof. F van Zyl's visit to Dakar received world-wide coverage and interest, but little arose from it. The Government "mentioned" that this would be the last visit with the ANC that they would allow.

Radical moves by students at such prominent universities, such as Cape Town, have made front-page news world-wide. Who can forget the scenes we have seen of police clamping down on UCT students?

And now, in the latest controversial incident at UCT, a police spy has been identified as being a student on the campus for two years. He passed as an extreme left-wing radical, while informing on left-wing student movements.

In another incident, a group of students was expelled, so 700 other students marched down to Bremmer Administration Building and demanded to be expelled.

The resignation of Rev. A. Hendrikse is another example of opposition demanding that the Government listen to their pleas and react to them.

What does the future hold for SA? Will strikes and trade union activities start to dictate to the Government? When will a peaceful settlement be reached? We wait patiently for the answers.





"The times they are changing ..." At the *Market Theatre* in Johannesburg. Mbogeni Ngema's Sarafina is playing and everyone's talking about this Soweto musical which is to open in New York some time next year.

The musical celebrates Mbaquanga, (South African township music) and "the power of the children". The action takes place in a high-school in Soweto. The good guys are the pupils, particularly the brave young Sarafina. The bad guys are the police, the army, P.W. Botha and the Afrikaans language. None of this is merely implied, it is all sung out as directly and powerfully as a kick in the solar plexus ... which is exactly how it feels to me and my friends who left before such things were ever said in public.

The audience lap it up. At least 50% are black. "It's R16:00 a ticket," says my friend." Do they get cheaper seats?" Our host snickers, "What do you think it's like 3rd class on the train?" She is embarrassed ... but she has been away a long time.

At interval we talk in whispers. We are outsiders afraid to make fools of ourselves by saying something about Soweto that would make us look silly in front of these people who live there. "Who's bloody Market theatre is this anyway?" says my friend. "They are making me feel like an intruder."

After the show we go across to "The Wherehouse", where Jonny Clegg and his band Savuka are belting out THIRD WORLD CHILD. He is pleading for peace and equality in the land of his birth. Shades of Bruce Springsteen, same basic sweaty honesty. He's all the rage. A sleeveless T-shirt shows up his white skin in contrast to Savuka who are mainly black. The place is full. People have been lining up since 3 p.m. ... luckily our host had influence.



Sandton City

Many of the shop assistants are black. Some of the white shoppers have difficulty with this. In smart boutiques conversations like this are heard.

Sales Clerk: May I help you?

Customer: I need this in a 34.

Clerk: We don't have any 34's left.

Customer: But I phoned and asked. This morning they said you had them. Please check.

Clerk: I don't have to check. I know. We sold a lot of them today.

Customer: You couldn't have sold all in one day.

Clerk: We did.

Stalemate. She looks around for some one who knows what's going on, some one reliable, helpful, white. She sees the manager in a corner.

Customer: Listen I need a 34 in this and the girl won't even look to see if you have one. Please can you help me? Manager: I'm sorry but we've had a run on those shirts

today and I have no 34's left. I actually looked for one just now. Sorry.

Customer: Oh. Well I don't know why she just didn't

tell me that. Thank you.

She glares at the sales assistant who smirks.

At Home

The son of my mothers maid, rejects the suit I give him ... because it's out of style. His mother just shakes her head. "It is the time of the children" she says. "Now we listen to them. We must."

Downtown

A by-election in Hillbrow. Only 19% vote. The students don't vote, no-one knows exactly why. The Nats get another seat in The Jhb City Council.

Powerful businessmen discuss what's happening on the Johannesburg Stock exchange. However, every now and then they drop hints about trade unions in their factories: not sure how seriously to take them, they try and find out what the others are doing.

A Wimpy Bar in town, half the customers are black. I feel unsure of myself. Is this their place or ours. The black waitress calls me "Mama" not "Madam". I like that.

There is a third world feel in the air. Subtle, but unmistakable, it is difficult to describe ... "but the times they are a changing."

Visas to Freedom ...

Since its founding in 1980, more than 4 million Jews and thousands of non-Jews have received assistance from HIAS - the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society. To those whose lives have been overshadowed by fear, persecution, discrimination and harassment, HIAS has been, and still is, a beacon of hope.

The global movement of Jews who leave their homelands not from choice, but of necessity, is a very old story. Between 1968 and 1982 HIAS helped more than 100,000 Russian emigres start anew in the West. In early 1984 HIAS played a significant role in the airlift of 8,000 Ethiopian Jews from the Sudan to Israel and the organization continues to urge the government of Ethiopia to release the remaining 10,000 Jews still in captivity. In Iran the situation for Jews has deteriorated since the Islamic fundamentalist take-over. In the neighboring countries to which these persecuted Jews are able to escape, they turn to HIAS for help in resettling in Western Europe and America.

And what of tomorrow? The Soviet gates may once again open (there are 400,000 Jews awating permission to leave); the tinderbox in South Africa may ignite into full-fledged conflict; anyone of a dozen Latin American or Central American "hot-spots" may explode.

A LOOK AT JEWISH EDUCATION

Things are happening in the Community High School of Jewish Studies. The new principal, Ruth Levy, came to San Diego two months ago after nine years in Los Angeles. She has been involved in education as a teacher, curriculum writer, consultant and resource center person for the past twenty years. Ruth has been working with faculty members and others in order to create a program which will respond to the shared concerns, wishes, and ideas of students and parents about the High School. Many of the comments and suggestions that were collected are becoming realities.

The concept of a community school is important at the High School of Jewish Studies. It is especially meaningful in San Diego where Jewish students from South Africa, Mexico, Israel, and the United States are able to interact. The school provides opportunities for these youngsters to meet and become familiar with the many faces of Judasim, to be comfortable with their Jewishness and explore it in an encouraging and supportive atmosphere.

The High School of Jewish Studies has a special program for incoming 8th grade students. Realizing how important it is to give first year students a strong feeling of caring and belonging, topics will be geared to their special interests. Students will have a teacher-leader who will be with them for the two hours on Tuesday nights, and who will work with them on building a sense of community within their group.

The 9th and 10th grades will have one core class and one elective. Two excellent teachers will each teach a core class to their grade level and the students will choose a


second class from a variety of electives offered to their grade.

The core class for the 9th grade is taught by Dan Schaffer. Dan is well known to many in the community as a teacher, writer, and "mensch". The focus of his class will be ethics and values based on biblical "case studies". Students will have many opportunities to examine, compare, evaluate and build a strong sense of Jewish ethical attitudes based on their experiences in his class.

The 10th grade core class will be taught by Todd Kobernick, who will bring his legal expertise, in addition to his experience in working with high school students, to each session. Todd's class will look at different legal issues, touching upon bio-ethics, current events, personal relationships and more. His course will develop a heightened awareness and sensitivity to crucial problems facing young Jewish adults today.

Many other teachers at the High School of Jewish Studies have been on its staff for years and are familiar with many of the students from different local synagogues. Through their work at the High School of Jewish Studies, these teachers are making a very important statement: Jewish education does not end with a child's Bar/Bat Mitzvah. The obligation and joy of "and you shall teach them to your children" is an ongoing process, enriching both the students and the teacher.




