They say a picture is worth a 1000 words. Sometimes that's true. A few months ago I received a picture from my daughter-in-law with 11 babies, all in a circle, all dressed in their new born finest, their mother's feet lining the edge. I glanced at it dozens of times, and showed it to all of my friends and family. Gratitude, joy and pride were the top of the list of the emotions I felt.

For this was a picture from my daughter-in-law's and my grandson Henry's first Shalom baby gathering. There they were in a group with 11 other Jewish moms, meeting for the first time. Shalom Baby, powered by the JCC, and superbly staffed by amazing professionals, Judy Nemzer and Vivien Dean, is among the best programs we offer in our city for Jewish engagement and inclusion. New parents receive a welcome basket when their babies are born, and then are helped to establish play groups and gatherings for new families. Programs like these are how we plant the seeds for the next generation of community.

I passed the picture along to Jean Gaylis, a force of nature, the founder of San Diego's Shalom baby program, and one of our communities most respected leaders. I met Jean over a decade ago and learned about Shalom Baby then. At

that time, I could only dream that one day I would have a grandchild who would be a happy participant of this program. I feel so grateful for Jean's vision and foresight, and now have seen firsthand the difference that Shalom Baby makes in young lives.

My daughter-in-law and son are makina friends through Shalom Baby at an important turning point in their lives. For many of us, it is the families you meet when your children are young that become your life-long friends. When I look at my own circle of dear friends, many now with children in high school and college, I feel so fortunate that we were brought together and bonded by our shared experience of being Jewish parents in the community.

I still look at the picture from

time to time. (My grandson is the one in stripes.) Every time I do, my heart is filled with gratitude; gratitude that we have a strong, Jewish future and a vibrant community. This is the gift we give to the next generation. I have been a Jewish volunteer for many years. For me and for many of my peers, it is this gift, this wonderful blessing, that drives us to help secure that Jewish future. We are lucky. Shabbat San Diego Rebuilding Communities







What is Shabbat San Diego?

On October 22-24, millions of Jews in over 500 cities in 65 countries around the world will join as one, in celebrating a unique, cohesive and meaningful Shabbat.

Coordinated by The Shabbos Project, Shabbat San Diego is the local organization implementing this program in San Diego and their program and activities have been specifically tailored to best suit this community.

Shabbat San Diego is an independent grassroots level community-wide organization of volunteers that are dedicated to encouraging the entire San Diego Jewish community to participate in a unique, international Jewish identity event that inspires all Jews to experience Shabbat together on the same day. The International Unity Shabbat will take place in more than 500 cities and 65 countries around the globe on October 22-24. "On this special Shabbat, San Diego's Jewish community of individuals, couples and families will

enjoy the wellbeing that Shabbat has delivered over the past several thousand years," said Selwyn Issakow, who spearheads this unique event.

"It's a day when we should be in harmony with the world, not to impose our will upon it. It is a day when all of our work is done. Think of it as a worldwide expense-free vacation from the trials and tribulations of the work week, and a better way to understand our place in the universe," he added.

Each congregation in San Diego County will celebrate the Shabbat in its own manner with its own customs and practices. Each will honor this day of community togetherness and rest.

Whose great idea was this?

The idea of a community wide Shabbat to unite Jews by observing a full, traditional Shabbat together as a community, originated in 2013 in South Africa. The Chief Rabbi Warren Goldstein's Shabbat Project, was able to motivate tens of thousands of Jews in South Africa to participate in





a similar event. In 2014 The Shabbos Project went global. Shabbat San Diego used the knowledge gained from this experience and more than 10,000 San Diegans attended Shabbat San Diego events.

Is Shabbat San Diego for me?

Shabbat San Diego is for all San Diegans, affiliated and non-affiliated. Communal activities will be structured to meet the needs of all. The tagline, "Keeping It Together" refers to Jews of San Diego and around the world, across divisions and all denominations. The purpose is to share this experience together.

Keeping It Together, also illustrates the unique restorative powers and the opportunity for deep physical, emotional and spiritual rejuvenation that the Shabbat experience affords each and every one of us.

Shabbat San Diego encourages a Shabbat experience that includes: spending time with family, visiting friends, attending services, studying Judaism, enjoying Shabbat dinner with traditional rituals, contemplating our life gifts, and singing. We hope that by experiencing the magic of Shabbat just once, we can rejuvenate family and community life, restore Jewish pride and identity, and build Jewish unity across our community.

Why must I register for Shabbat San Diego?

When large groups of Jews gather in one place, there is always a need to be vigilant and cautious. For security reasons anyone who is not registered will not (under any circumstances) be allowed admission to the event.

Registration is FREE although donations are always welcome and accepted.

The Mega Challah Bake

Last year one of the most popular and well

attended events was the community challah bake.

"Can you imagine what it was like for several thousand people to get together to bake their



own challah from scratch,"Issakow told me this week.

"We provided the ingredients and the recipes and a mini city participated in this mega community bake off. It was one of the most uplifting zexperiences," he said.



It was so popular last year that this year it is being held in two locations to accommodate the demand.

The bake will be held on Thursday October 22 at 6:30 pm.

JITLI

My name is Gabriel Bloch, the counselor for 2016s JITLI trip to Israel. I had the privilege to take 10 kids on the trip of a lifetime, and this essay is a great representation of the trip and how it develops leadership skills in our community's teens.Jacobs International Teen Leadership Instiutute is a lot more than just a trip to Israel.

An experience of a lifetime. Those few simple words, when spoken, generate an immense amount of pressure. What experience can possibly classify as being "once in a lifetime?" There is a one word answer for that question: JITLI.

The Gary and Jerri-Ann Jacobs International Teen Leadership Institute, which was founded in 2000, works to form connections between four groups of teenagers. These four groups consist of American Jews, Israeli Jews, Israeli Arabs, and Palestinians, from four communities, San Diego, Sha'ar Hanegev, Segev Shalom, and Lakyia. Forty kids all together, learning about one another's differences, and developing an understanding to reach a goal: to promote coexistence between different cultures and religions.

I have recently returned from my own trip on JITLI this summer, and I can already see how it has affected not only my thinking, but my view of the world.

My motivation to join JITLI was simple: the promise of a trip to Israel. Little did I know all that I would gain from this program. Growing up in what I would call "a perfect little bubble" in Southern California, I knew very little about the ongoing conflict in Israel. I knew what I felt was important, and that was all. I've always had an affinity for expanding my horizons and seeing the opportunities that the world has to offer. This is what really made JITLI sound amazing for me. I knew I wanted to know more, I just didn't know where to start.

I joined JITLI with little expectations, and the hope that I would gain something, anything, that would make me feel more connected to this chaotic world, and to find hope. I was in Israel last summer during the war, and hearing all of the rockets was the final push I needed to want to help make a change. Out of all the things I could hope for, I only had one wish. To

make connections. And this wish was crystallized under the Israeli sun, tangibly, via the first handshakes that greeted us as we landed in the Ben-Gurion airport.

There is no way to describe the feeling of that first bus ride together. All of your emotions and wishes suddenly unfold before your eyes, and you finally understand how amazing the experience will truly be.

As I previously mentioned, the entirety of this trip surrounds the idea of teenage Jews and teenage Arabs bonding with one another. This in the beginning made me a little nervous. Truthfully, I have never met a group of kinder individuals. We were invited into their homes with open arms, and shared our stories with one another.

To experience the life of someone that appears to be so different from me, and yet at the same time are so similar. To talk and laugh together, as if we've known each other for years. That is what JITLI is.

We not only travelled around Israel together, but we also roomed with one another, visited their homes, and really embraced each others cultures. We visited both synagogues and mosques, and we opened our eyes to the ways of each others life.

Before JITLI, I was someone who was all talk, and no action. I wanted to see a change in the world, and to work towards some form of peace. But I had no idea of where to start, and then I was asked if I had heard about JITLI. I can now say that I have 39 new, incredible friends. And even though we all come from different backgrounds, we all love each other.

JITLI has allowed me to come to new realizations about the world, and am grateful for the experience. JITLI opened my eyes. It not only made me realize things about the world and

other cultures, but it made me learn about myself.

After having returned from this incredible experience, we, the San Diego group, have now been thinking about the future of this program. If you are a high school junior and intrested in the program, research www.jitli.org for more information. It honestly will be an experience of a lifetime.





September - end of summer, the racing crowd gone home, The Del Mar racetrack playing host to a newly implemented KAABOO music festival, and, on September 30th, the sun-setting on the current EB-5 regional center pilot program which since its inception in 1993, has allowed foreign investors to obtain green cards by investing in development projects without having to start their own businesses in the U.S.

PROGRAM EXTENDED

The program has been extended in three-year increments until now and every time this comes up, the main issues debated are security, fraud, mismanagement, oversight. Projects in economically challenged rural areas have seen substantial investments pour into projects that create jobs in these areas as a result of this program and the demand for green cards on this basis continues to grow as the immigration service tightens its reins on adjudications and intensifies its scrutiny on all regulatory paths to U.S. residence.

Proposed legislation to continue the regional center program and for this investor visa program in general, will raise the price tag from \$1-million to \$1.2-million, and for those investors in the targeted employment areas – those areas with high unemployment, the price tag will rise by an even higher percentage from \$500,000 to \$800,000.

There's a requirement for job creation in the EB-5 category, pilot program or not – 10 new jobs for U.S. workers, either directly or indirectly – and you have two years from the time of being granted conditional residence on the basis of your investment, to remove the conditions by proving that you have met the criteria.

IMMIGRATION INVESTOR PROGRAM

The Immigrant Investor Program was created by the United States Congress' Immigration Act of 1990 (IMMACT90) that overhauled immigration law and created an investor program to stimulate the U.S. economy by giving foreigners with sufficient resources the ability to get a green card by investing in an American commercial enterprise.

In 1993, Congress created the Immigrant Investor Pilot Program to increase interest in the EB-5 visa program by establishing EB-5 regional centers - business entities approved for special designation by the United States Citizenship and Immigration Service (USCIS) to administer EB-5 investments and create jobs. So it meant you did not have to create your own business in the U.S., either in a regular or high unemployment area (depending on the price tag you could afford), but could invest in projects already set up and running.

In the late 1990's, there were several major overhauls to the EB-5 program, prompted by the findings that all was not exactly kosher and, in 1998, significant changes to the program were implemented. Investors had to provide proof that the monies going into their EB-5 investments originated from lawful sources - as some immigration lawyers quip, "going all the way back to the mint..." - and that investors were personally involved with their EB-5 projects. Also, investment return guarantees were prohibited.

NEW LEGISLATION PROPOSED

In June, bipartisan legislation was introduced by Senate Judiciary Chairman Charles Grassley (R-lowa) and Ranking Member Patrick Leahy (D-Vermont). The bill proposes reauthorization and reforms on many key components of the EB-5 Immigrant Investor Program.

The proposed legislation makes several changes that have widespread implications for the entire EB-5 program, not only the regional center program. There are many more checks and balances included in the proposed legislation but the most exciting thing for potential investors – is that there is a proposal for premium processing. This means that if you want to pay extra to the immigration service (and why not, where you've just sunk at least \$800,000 into the project?) within 15 days of submitting a rigorously scrutinized application, your petition will be adjudicated.

So when October 1 rolls round, you'll still be able to pay to play: we're waiting for the legislative update on the rules, but by all accounts, compliance may be harder, scrutiny may be higher, but the game will be won so much faster.

This exhibit, which will walk you down the wind-swept



THERE is little in the way of bright news about South Africa's economy—and not just because power cuts are plunging neighbourhoods into darkness several times a week. According to figures released on May 26th, annual GDP grew by a mere 1.3% in the first three months of this year, a crawl compared with the 4.1% achieved in the fourth quarter of 2014. Unemployment is soaring. Even using a narrow definition, it stands at 26.4%, the highest since 2003.

"The numbers are saying 'something has to be done, and done quickly'," says Pali Lehohla, South Africa's statistician-general. But where to begin? Power shortages under Eskom, the failing state utility, have dampened manufacturing, drought has hit agriculture and tourism, a rare boon, has been hampered by much-criticised new visa requirements. Rating agencies have warned that South Africa is dancing dangerously close to junk status

STRIKES ARE HURTING

Joblessness is particularly worrying. The expanded rate, which includes "discouraged" workers who have simply given up trying to find a job, rose to 36.1% in the first quarter of 2015.

Even many of those with jobs are unhappy. Strikes are hurting mining. Talks between unions and gold-mine bosses are due to begin in early June. But with unions opening the bargaining by demanding that basic pay for unskilled mineworkers be doubled, prospects of an early settlement seem poor. Last year similar demands at platinum mines sparked five months of labour unrest.


The weak economy is stoking social unrest and public violence. Foreigners, seen as competition for scarce jobs, were targeted in a recent spate of xenophobic attacks that left at least seven people dead. The IRR, a think-tank in Johannesburg, says that protests have nearly doubled since 2010. Many relate to the provision of basic services such as water and electricity. Inequality remains high. A report by the Boston Consulting Group, a consultancy, placed South Africa 138th of 149

countries for its ability to turn the country's wealth into well-being for its people.

LITTLE SIGN OF IMPROVEMNET

So far the government of President Jacob Zuma has shown little sign of being able to improve matters. The African National Congress, the ruling party, is bogged down in internal political battles, not least over whether to pursue capitalist or socialist economics. The government's much-touted National Development Plan, a market-friendly strategy to encourage investment and growth, is largely ignored. Even by the ANC's own standards, it is failing: only 2% growth is expected in 2015 when the economy needs to expand by at least 5% a year to reduce unemployment.

Yet instead of addressing the economic crisis when he appeared in parliament soon after the poor numbers, Mr Zuma cracked jokes and mimicked the leader of the opposition, giggling: "he he he... hai

ago I got my usual phone call from my daughter at 10.30 pm our time - and 8.30 in Jerusalem.

On Motzei Shabbas 3 weeks

The opening gambit to me was:

"come to Israel". I agreed, thinking maybe next month, 3 months - or whenver. Instead she said: "come tomorrow".

Without hesitation I agreed and she was immediately on the phone to my son, who was then also on the phone for me to stay at their house so that we could set the alarm for four am and leave for the airport at five.

I was pleasantly surprised to find that EI AI was not as cramped as it used to be, and even though I got the middle, seat I survived.

This is the first time I have arrived in Israel during the day and so was able to see the dividing wall between Israel and the Palestinians. I remarked to my daughter that they built tunnels instead!!

PEACEFUL BUT AWARE

Baruch Hashem it was relatively peaceful. Of course one is always aware, especially when taking a cab since the news on the radio is always turned on.

I also found was that whenever the cab arrived or dropped me off I would always say "thank you very much with a smile and in response would always get: "it is my pleasure", Even though my daughter paid the fare. It did not take long for the Israeli charm to show itself.

Of course the usual bartering went on in Gaullah. Since it was now Shmits, (which is every seven years and the ground has to remain fallow, the Israeli fruit and vegetables were not at their peak this time.

Weather-wise, it was very hot, around 99 degrees, but the coldness of the air conditioner really saved us. Personally, I don't like this artificial coldness. One is transported from the Mediterranean heat to the polar regions with the click of switch .

On arriving at my daughter's flat the sun was bright with a slight breeze fanning the Judean hills and the undulating majesty like the sway of a woman's hips, beckoned with a softly unspoken welcome!

And then, as day began its journey towards evening, the sky took on the soft blush of a day's ending and twilight's vermillion spread across Jerusalem.

ALL THIS TO THE HAUNTING STRAINS OF BEAUTIFUL ISRAELI MUSIC

I had strong memories from many years ago, when my first grandson was born and my son-in-law took me to see the wall. It was nearly midnight with the harsh raw cold of the November night. I remembered that as we walked along the Wall, the sounds of young Yeshiva boys singing prayerful songs seemed to come out of the stones in the Wall.

THAT WAS WHEN I FELL IN LOVE WITH ISRAEL.

Coming back the plane was delayed and we left after 2 a.m.l had the aisle seat and a young woman sat at the window seat and covered her head and shoulders with the blanket and slept and slept. A few hours before we landed she awoke and we chatted. It was fascinating.

She was a journalist and that this was her first visit to Israel. She was not Jewish and showed me pictures taken with a Greek Orthodox priest and with religious Jews.

She said she didn't know what to expect visiting Israel but thought it was absolutely fascinating. She was amazed by all its achievements and had already booked a ticket to return to Israel next year. She said that tiny little Israel is an example to the world. She asked for my email address and told me she had so enjoyed talking to me.

AND SUDDENLY I WAS IN AMERICA.

A melange of cultures and ideas but with the bond of Hashem.I had crossed the world. Two continents and 2 worlds brought together by the love of my wonderful family in Israel and in San Diego.

Anti-semitism in South Africa has reached new highs.

Jewish supporters protest against a proposal from South African trade minister Ron Davies to label goods originating from Israel as 'Made in occupied Palestinian territories'.

Anti-semitism in South Africa reached new highs.

The student anti-Israel movement in South Africa is more extreme than most. In February, the student government at the Durban University of Technology called for the expulsion of Jewish students, particularly supporters of Israel. In March, the Congress of South African Students (COSAS) responded to a protest in which the lives of Jews were threatened by denouncing the presence of the Community Security Organization, whose purpose is to protect Jews and who were cooperating with local police. The COSAS called the South African Board of Jewish Deputies, an organization that represents South Africa's Jews, "the Jewish ISIS" that "threatens our sovereignty through, illegal [sic], mercenaries, militia and invasion." They hastened to add that they had nothing against Jews, but only against those who have long represented them in South Africa, and concluded with this flourish: "Away racist Jewish deputies away!

It is, therefore, no surprise that the South African Students Congress (SASCO) has gotten into the act by suspending three student members for visiting Israel on a trip sponsored by the South Africa Israel forum. "We view an act by some of our members to visit Israel as crossing the picket line." This move is more surprising than it seems. As offensive as boycotts like the one adopted by the American Studies Association are, no one there has proposed to discipline members who buck it. SASCO on the other hand, wishes "to state categorically that SASCO is a voluntary organization where members join and subordinate themselves to its constitution, its policies, and its resolutions. Therefore [they] urge all [their] members to respect, defend and advance all decisions of the organization without exception." SASCO may be an extreme organization, officially aiming to "ensure the destruction of capitalist relations of production and the ushering of a socialist society." But it is by

no means marginal; Haaretz calls it the "biggest South African student organization."

There is no adult in the room here. Obed Bapela, a deputy minister for Performance, Monitoring, and Evaluation in the President's office, has said that the ruling African National Congress will investigate the students for bringing the ANC into "disrepute" Bapela, by the way was present at the February protest I mentioned, in which the crowd chanted, among other things, "You Jews do not belong here in South Africa." Bapela apparently had no problem with that, but did find time to complain of the "foreign force" brought in by the South African Board of Jewish Deputies, reminding the crowd that "South Africa is our country."

Not all critics of Israel, even harsh critics, are anti-Semitic, but there can be no question about the running together of anti-Israel and anti-Jewish sentiment in South Africa, a nation in which, according to the Anti-Defamation League, 50 percent of respondents to its survey on attitudes toward Jews agreed that "People hate Jews because of the way Jews behave." Let's try to remember that the next time South Africa's leaders try to school us on solidarity.


Arnold Vosloo

My wife Carole and I debated whether we should sit on a plane for 25 hours, and attend an uncle's birthday in South Africa. We decided that was too long to sit and instead, we opted to spend way more hours than that sitting on our motorcycle.

Once the decision was made, we immediately called the Best Western in Deadwood South Dakota, where (for a mere \$400 a night you can book a room that usually costs around \$75.00) you can stay just 11 miles from Sturgis South Dakota.

That was the start of our planning for a cross-country trip to Sturgis, where in 1938, a couple of guys who rode Harley Davidson motorcycles decided to escape the daily grind of their lives and Sturgis -- the largest motorcycle rally in the world was born.

This year Sturgis celebrated its 75th Anniversary and was the largest rally ever. Over a million people attended on about 750,000 bikes.

Carole and I got busy on the logistics.

How far should we travel each day? What should we see along the way and where will we stay each night?

I ride a modified 2010 Harley Davidson Road King Classic that I have customized for travel. It is an incredibly comfortable piece of machinery and so we packed our bags, strapped them on to the bike and were ready to go.

THE TRIP BEGINS

We left on July 28 for Las Vegas where we stayed the night. We took off for Utah at 6.30 am to beat the heat and rode through Zion and Brice Canyons to Moab, spending time to view the red rocks and natural bridges cut out of stone. This is an amazing sight and really worth visiting. From there we went on to Gunnison Colorado, and rode through the Rockies, to Lusk Wyoming.

Then we rode to Deadwood South Dakota and Sturgis. It is hard to appreciate the mayhem, noise and spectacle created by thousands of Harley Davidson motorbikes in every shape and color.

No matter where we rode, slept or saw the sights, there was always one constant, --motorcycles, motorcycles and more motorcycles. Wherever we rode, from Mt. Rushmore to the Black Hills there was never a break

from the bikes coming and going.

There was this constant roar and the earth shook day and night. This was Motorbike Mecca.

PEOPLE WATCHING

Now, the spectacle created by the motorbikes is absolutely amazing but nothing can compare to the spectacle created by the people who attend Sturgis. If people-watching is your thing, there is no better place to practice your craft than Sturgis, South Dakota.

You will see exotic tattooed guys with bodies like chiseled studs riding with 500 pound giants whose motorcycles look like toys beneath their gargantuan bulk. You see it all.

And then there are their biker women. Some are riding in the 80 degree heat in only a pair of leather chaps and a thong. Or some that felt underwear was not necessary at all. Many decided that body paint was a clothing item while others thought that strategically placed pieces of duct tape would do the trick. Sturgis is no place for the squeamish.

The riding was amazing and the weather almost flawless. And while

the sights like Mt, Rushmore were breathtaking – we were here for Bike Week.

South Africa vs. India Test match SUNDAY, JUNE 28 @ 3:30PM Standley Park - 3585 Governor Dr.


